

# SRM/Range Science Education Council (RSEC) Early Career Undergraduate Teaching Award Dr. Lesley R. Morris

Dr. Lesley Morris was recognized with the SRM/RSEC Early Career Undergraduate Teaching Award for her excellence in teaching and advising Range Management students. This award recognizes faculty/instructors in the early stages of their teaching careers (less than 10 years' experience).

#### **SRM Honor Awards**

#### W.R. Chapline Research Award Dr. Roger Sheley

Dr. Roger Sheley was recognized with the W.R. Chapline Research Award for his exceptional and sustained research accomplishments in rangeland science.

Dr. Sheley's career accomplishments have played an important role in defining modern perception of the ecology and management of rangeland weeds. As a scientist, the breadth and impact of his work in basic and applied rangeland weed ecology are perhaps unparalleled, and this research has served as a foundation for uniting ecological theory and land management strategies through Ecologically Based Invasive Plant Management (EBIPM). EBIPM has inspired and challenged a generation of rangeland managers and scientists to break from the tradition of prescriptive, symptom-based weed treatments, and embrace a new paradigm of using ecology to diagnose and ultimately mitigate factors that cause weed infestations.



In recent years, Dr. Sheley has also served as Editor-in-Chief of the *Rangeland Ecology and Management* journal. His high standards for excellence have helped to make this journal a success.

#### Sustained Lifetime Achievement Award Dr. Tony Svejcar

Dr. Tony Svejcar was recognized with the Sustained Lifetime Achievement Award for his long-term contributions to the art and science of range management and to the Society for Range Management.

Dr. Svejcar is a preeminent scientist who is nationally and internationally recognized for his many significant contributions to rangeland science and management. He initiated the Agricultural Research Service's CO2 Flux Network, an effort designed to identify the influence of U.S. rangelands on the global carbon cycle. Dr. Svejcar also pioneered use of the stable isotope 13C for carbon cycling research. Dr. Svejcar and his coinvestigators have tested and refined an array of techniques for reducing or managing expanding populations of western juniper and he has made lasting



contributions to our understanding of the seedling ecology of native plant species in the sagebrush steppe.

Dr. Svejcar's work has generated over 200 publications, making it is easy to look past what is perhaps his greatest accomplishment. Not only does Dr. Svejcar possess a superior scientific aptitude, but his humility, drive, leadership skills, and strong sense of purpose, enable him to leverage that aptitude by helping other researchers and students to realize their own potential. Nowhere is this more evident than at the Eastern Oregon Agricultural Research Center in Burns, Oregon, where he was Research Leader for ARS for nearly 30 years. During that time he selflessly gave of his talents to build a regional center of excellence for customer-driven rangeland research whose influence now operates at the global scale.

# Outstanding Achievement Award for Research/Academia Dr. Bob Ehrhart

Dr. Bob Ehrhart was recognized with the Outstanding Achievement Award for Research/Academia.

After retiring as a Lt. Colonel for the U.S. Air Force, Dr. Ehrhart returned to school, studied Range and Watershed Management at the University of Montana, and began a whole new career as a riparian specialist and educator!

Bob's riparian work, both in Montana and in Oregon, has been remarkable. He authored publications which are still in active use and which, in understandable terms, spell out the intricacies of this complex field! As a professor at Oregon State University's Cascades Campus in Bend, OR, Dr. Ehrhart was rewarded as not only a favorite professor, but one who

was life-changing in his ability to encourage the best from each of his students! He developed and successfully taught several online Rangeland Science courses for place-bound students interested in pursuing or continuing their education in the discipline.

Dr. Ehrhart is a renowned scientist, a respected teacher, a beloved mentor, and a cherished colleague. His influence is great, his legacy is strong, and his friendships are honest and true. He is a champion of rangeland management and ecology, and fully deserving of the award: Outstanding Achievement!

#### Will Keller honored as 2017 Norm McClure Lifetime Achievement Award Winner

Norm McClure was a true champion of the Coordinated Resource Management Planning (CRM) process. From his work we have a state of Washington Annual CRM Executive Tour where the heads of federal and state agencies get together once a year and tour a different area looking at CRM planning and brain storm how to work together in the up coming year. We have holding these meetings now for 30 years here in the Okanogan. One of the greatest accomplishments we have seen is communication. This is a structured time and place set aside to discuss the work at hand where everyone is given the chance to say what is on their heart. In closing this was a tremendous honor for me.

Will Keller came to Okanogan County via Stevens County in 1989 as a Range Management Specialist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service. The early years of his career were spent in a shared position between NRCS and the Washington Department of Natural Resources. He worked with livestock producers whose herds grazed private and public lands, and particularly on DNR lands.

Will was instrumental in bringing Coordinated Resource Management as a planning tool to Okanogan County. He has worked with upwards of at least three dozen ranchers, countless agency representatives, and others to facilitate these collaborative meetings that provide clarity and a modicum of certainty to the producers and agencies alike for how grazing will be implemented each year.

Will is far from just a facilitator. He is the Grazing Land Whisperer. He is one of two people I know that can drive by range land at 60 miles per hour and give you an accurate stocking rate, dominant grass species, and a fair guess about the overall health of the ground. He is part botanist, part rancher, part mountain goat, and part ecologist. Will can walk your legs off as he marches through acres upon acres of range ground assessing forage conditions, potential erosion or water quality issues, and determining opportunities for improving conditions for the livestock, wildlife, and more. 

### Eight things you need to know about parking on the EOU campus.

Parking in the Community Stadium parking lot is free! To park anywhere else on campus, you must have a permit. Please see the map.

Permits for the year or for each term may be purchased in the Student Accounts office in Inlow Hall #101. Permits for the year cost \$75 and permits for each term cost \$30.

A single parking citation will cost you \$15, so you can see that it makes much more sense to purchase a permit than to take the risk of getting a costly citation.

New this year are the 'dedicated' parking spaces in each lot. Some spaces are dedicated only for students, some only for faculty and some only for staff. These are available on a first come-first served basis. Purchasing a permit for the year or the term allows you to park in an appropriate dedicated parking space.

You may also purchase a daily permit from the parking permit dispensing machine located outside Loso Hall for a cost of \$2 per day. These permits allow you to park in a general space in any lot, but do not allow you to park in any of the dedicated spaces.

Reserved parking spaces may be purchased for certain parking lots at a cost of \$280 for the academic year. These permits allow the permit holder to park in their designated reserved space or in a general parking space. Please contact Bill Benson, Asst. Parking rules are enforced from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.
